

FUTURE READY @JSAMS

Retired United States Army General Eric Shinseki once said, "If you don't like change, you're going to like irrelevance even less". It's hard for students in our Middle School to imagine a world without Instagram, Snapchat, or cell phones. Most of our students no longer associate "TikTok" with the sound a clock makes. In fact, the simple notion of telling time on anything other than a digital clock is often a foreign concept. Our world is transitioning as rapidly as the leaves are changing colors around us.

At the Jersey Shore Area School District we are committed to making sure our students are prepared for the next step in their life's plan, even knowing that step may not currently exist. We are very excited about what we're doing at the middle school to embrace this changing world as we focus on developing our students with skills that will enhance their employability in the future.

The 2019-2020 school year at JSAMS continues to focus on the idea of Coming Alive. Our students are encouraged to pursue their passions and to be at their best, while making others around them better. During daily Personalized Learning Time they constantly set, monitor, and obtain weekly academic and behavioral goals. Our students are meeting the challenges of the traditional academic setting, while also getting exposed to some changes to the traditional middle school day.

Students at JSAMS now have an opportunity to focus specifically on being future ready through the addition of our Intro to Pathways course. The addition of the Come Alive period has provided opportunities to focus on building relationships while working on employability skills. Often undervalued as "soft skills", these skills are those that are students need in order to be prepared for the next step in their life's plan, even if that step isn't something we're currently familiar with.

GIRLS ON THE RUN OFF TO POSITIVE START AT JSAE

Tuesday or Thursday after school, you will hear the enthusiastic voices of girls in grades 3-5 greeting each other as they warm-up in the gymnasium. Mrs. Jodi Woleslagle, one of our elementary life skills teachers, was the driving force for initiating a Girls on the Run program at JSE. She was seeing posts from friends on social media who had daughters participating in Girls on the Run programs at their schools. With the small population that she teaches, she does not always get the opportunity to build relationships with students outside of her classroom. The Girls on the Run Program not only gives her the opportunity to meet new students, but it also helps her to make a difference in their lives.



"We inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running," is the mission of a Girls on the Run program. Their vision is nothing short of inspiring. "We envision a world where every girl knows and activates her limitless potential and is free to boldly pursue her dreams."

Mrs. Woleslagle presented her idea to the school board last spring. Upon receiving board approval, Ms. Adrienne Johnston, Jersey Shore Elementary Principal, and Mrs. Woleslagle met with Jill Girio, Girls on the Run Program Coordinator for the Greater Susquehanna Valley, and discussed what they would need and how to pursue those resources.

The support she received after announcing her goal of starting a Girls on the Run Program at Jersey Shore Elementary, last May, was astounding! Several teachers joined forces with Mrs. Woleslagle to volunteer to be coaches: Mrs. Theresa Caimi, Mrs. Ann Knipe, Mrs. Amy Jones, and Ms. Samantha Moon. In addition, she received support from Ms.

Andrea Decker, our Jersey Shore Elementary PTO President, as one of our volunteer coaches. All of the Girls on the Run Coaches had to complete a series of online trainings and a 5-hour on-site training at Bucknell University before they could develop a program at JSE.



After a short assembly on September 11th, registrations poured in; we now have 32 girls enrolled in the program. Mrs. Woleslagle shared that she did not anticipate such a huge turnout, but that they were beyond excited! Gianna Martino, a fifth grade student at JSE, joined the program because it sounded fun, she wanted to improve herself, and she wanted to reach the goal of running a 5K, which is about 3 miles. Gianna elaborated, stating that now that she has been in the program a few weeks, she likes making her goals and cheering other girls to reach their goals. She feels the greatest benefit is everyone being nice to each other and working together. What would she tell others about the program? "Make the miracle happen," smiled Gianna.

At the end of the 10-week program, there is a celebratory 5K at The Miller Center, in Lewisburg. The 5K is on Sunday, November 17th and is attended by all of the girls participating in the Girls on the Run Program in the Greater Susquehanna Valley. The girls are looking forward to their first race and all of the fun activities that they will participate in that day! Please join us in cheering the girls as they train to meet their goal of running in the 5K and come out to support their race on November 17th!

Tersey Shore High School began the 2019-20 school year with a greater focus on helping our students to be college and career ready. New College and Career standards enacted by the state of Pennsylvania guided us through this process. We ended the 2018-19 school year with a review of these standards. We found that a great majority of them are already integrated into the curriculum offered to our students. These same courses and associated standards introduce students to the skills related to college and the work force and include: career awareness and preparation, career acquisition, career retention and advancement, and entrepreneurship. As our students progress through their courses they develop communication skills through small and large group settings. Student involvement in extracurricular activities builds leadership skills, goal setting, and discipline. Over 50 percent of our students are members of a club or a sport. Many of these clubs are service oriented, connecting our students to the community in new ways. Through participation in these activities students are also connected to national organizations which help to

build career and college networks. The greatest example of our school's involvement with the community is #weSHOREcare. This program continues this school year with a renewed focus on filling food boxes.

One of the greatest assets at the high school that is helping our students to prepare for the next stage of their lives in the Pathway system. This system provides a structured course progression toward a specific area of interest: Arts and Media; Health & Science; Human Services; Business, Finance, and Information Technology; Engineering & Industry. While core course work introduces students to content that helps them to understand the world within which they live, builds critical thinking skills, and develops a well-rounded individual the Pathway courses provide students with structured content that focuses on a career field

Through the systems which the district has worked to develop over the years, we are confident we create life-long learners who are prepared to apply what they have learned to face a wide-range of challenges in an innovative way.
